Council has a working session scheduled for February 29. The purpose of the Work Session is to hear from State and local experts regarding the 1,4 Dioxane plume.

The Stadium Boulevard road repair project between Hutchins and the Stadium Bridge was scheduled to begin this year; however, bids have come in higher than expected and the project will have to be scaled to fit within the budget. The project will be delayed due to the unexpectedly high bids and will be rebid later this year through MDOT.

1. Jeff Hayner - Financing Local Public Improvements, and Special Assessment Ordinance (C-2)

Jeff Hayner, 1807 Pontiac Trail, spoke in support of the proposed ordinance regarding the financing of local public improvements. He urged Council to support this ordinance, stating it brings parity.

2. Kathy Griswold - Purchase Order with SeeClickFix, Inc. for Software Support (CA-14)

Kathy Griswold, 3565 Foxhunt Drive, spoke in support of CA-14, a purchase order with SeeClickFix, Inc. for software support. She spoke in support of the A2FixIt program.

3. Lorraine Shapiro - Ann Arbor City Hall Survey

Lorraine Shapiro, 1484 Green Road, expressed concerns regarding the validity of the City's previous survey of residents on the City's deer management efforts and support for a deer cull. She expressed concern about the validity of a future survey on this topic.

4. Henry Herskovitz - Holocaust

Henry Herskovitz, 404 Mark Hannah Place, spoke about the Holocaust and liberating Palestine.

5. Grant Shafer - Sanitation

Grant Shafer, Ypsilanti resident, expressed concern about the conduct of the USDA sharpshooters and stated the remains of decapitated deer have been found throughout the City parks.

6. Peter Houk - Huron Parkway Crosswalk

Peter Houk, 2025 Yeoman Court, a member of the Washtenaw Bicycling and Walking Coalition, expressed concern about the crosswalk on Huron Parkway. He urged Council to look at this project and include funding for improvements in the upcoming budget.

7. Sally Daniels - Abuse of Power

Sally Daniels, 1847 Packard, spoke in opposition to the City's deer cull. She urged Council to address the ongoing illegal poaching that is occurring in the City.

8. Sarah Byers - History of Ann Arbor

Sarah Byers, 1308 Traver, spoke in opposition to the deer cull.

9. Sunday Harvie - Deer Cull

Sunday Harvie, a Milford, Michigan resident, spoke in opposition to the City's cull.

10. Robert McGee - Respect to Councilmembers

Robert McGee, 2245 Placid Way, spoke about respect for Council Members and respect for opposing viewpoints. He stated his petition circulators will only include those who treat others with respect and he and his group are not associating with those folks who are treating others with disrespect.

CC COMMUNICATIONS FROM COUNCIL

COUNCILMEMBER LUMM

Councilmember Lumm stated she and Councilmember Westphal will be bringing forward a resolution at the next Council meeting requesting funding for a pedestrian crosswalk at the Huron High School driveway on Huron Parkway, north of Geddes. A grant has also been applied for by City staff to obtain the \$90,000 required to include a Rectangular Rapid Flashing Beacon light (RRFB). The resolution will identify an alternative funding source so that that project can proceed without the grant funds, if necessary, said Lumm.

Councilmember Lumm also reported that the City Planning Commission would be holding a public hearing regarding the South Pond Village project, tomorrow evening, Wednesday, February 17 at 7 p.m.

Councilmember Lumm stated there is a neighborhood meeting hosted by the University of Michigan on February 25 from 6:30 to 8:00 p.m. regarding their plans for a transportation operation center.

COUNCILMEMBER ACKERMAN

Councilmember Ackerman announced that there is a meeting scheduled at the Downtown Library on the subject of Accessory Dwelling Units. The meeting will be held in the Fourth Floor Board Room on February 25 from 6:30 to 8:30 p.m.

COUNCILMEMBER KAILASAPATHY

Councilmember Kailasapathy stated she will be bringing a resolution forward to the March 10 City Council meeting regarding the Human Rights Commission report on a

possible Police Oversight Board. She stated as part of the implementation of the recommendations, a budget amendment will be needed to hire an independent auditor to evaluate the Police Department and set up the oversight board, if desired.

COUNCILMEMBER WARPEHOSKI

Councilmember Warpehoski noted that the May 9 Work Session was tentatively scheduled to discuss pedestrian safety issues. He stated this Work Session will be a good opportunity for an in-depth discussion of all pedestrian and safety issues. He also spoke in support of the City's SeeClickFix tool.

Councilmember Warpehoski also thanked Mr. McGee for the reminder about respect. It is always important for good decorum and open communication, he stated.

COUNCILMEMBER WESTPHAL

Councilmember Westphal encouraged citizens interested in participating to contact the Mayor's Office and apply for boards and commissions. He noted that a large group of applications were provided tonight and encouraged additional interested folks to apply.

COUNCILMEMBER GRAND

Councilmember Grand reported on Ward 3 issues, noting that Wednesday, February 24 at 7:00 p.m., a neighborhood meeting would be held at Mitchell Elementary School in the multipurpose room, regarding Phase 2 road improvements for the Spring Water subdivision.

On Tuesday, February 23 at 6:30 p.m., a downtown dog park meeting will be held at City Hall regarding the selection of Broadway Park as the near-downtown park, said Councilmember Grand. She said a diverse group of citizens, professionals and staff participated in the selection of Broadway Park. There is also a survey on the City's homepage for citizens to provide input.

Councilmember Grand stated that also on February 23, a NAP meeting will be held at the NAP offices, 3875 E. Huron River Drive, from 7 to 8:30 p.m. to discuss ecological burns. More information is available at www.a2gov.org/napburn

COUNCILMEMBER EATON

Councilmember Eaton reported that the February 3 Cable Communications Commission was scheduled, but did not have a quorum and was unable to meet. He stated the Commission has two vacancies, making it challenging to reach a quorum, and he encouraged interested residents to apply.

PUBLIC COMMENT - GENERAL (3 MINUTES EACH)

Ed Vielmetti, 1210 Brooklyn, expressed concerns regarding the conduct of the Planning Commission Executive Committee, noting that minutes are not taken and that the committee meets via teleconference.

Eric Lipson, 1318 Rosedale, spoke about the delay of the Stadium Boulevard resurfacing project, expressing concern regarding the pedestrian crosswalk on Stadium Boulevard at Edgewood near Pioneer High School. He stated the current arrangement is very dangerous for students crossing the street. He also complimented the City regarding the design of the Argo Cascades, and the new pedestrian path at Rose Street. He also urged Council to add street lights to the Packard/State Street area, stating it is very dark.

Cathy Shafer, Ward 4 resident, spoke about respect and urged Council to listen to the concerns raised by the residents who come to speak, including those who speak against the cull.

Lisa Abrams, 2745 Ember Way, spoke in opposition to the City's deer cull and informed Council that residents found deer carcasses in Bird Hills Nature Area.

An unidentified member of the audience spoke in opposition to the City's deer cull and expressed concerns about lead contamination in the venison meat.

Craig Swenson, representing the Police and Fire Chiefs in Washtenaw County, spoke about the 800MHz radio system millage renewal on the March 8 ballot. He spoke about the radio system that was put in place with the current millage and stated the renewal will help replace and upgrade systems.

An unidentified member of the audience spoke in opposition to the City's deer cull and questioned the City's deer management citizen survey efforts.

David Silkworth, Ward 5 resident, spoke in opposition to the City's deer cull, stating the cull efforts are not in the areas where overgrazing of deer are found. He urged

Council to consider what the actual problem is with deer and deer overpopulation and address it appropriately.

Lorraine Shapiro, Ward 2 resident, spoke in support of a modified pedestrian crosswalk at Huron Parkway. She also urged the City to put up deer crossing signs where deer/vehicle accidents are known to have occurred.

Dwight Smith, Ann Arbor resident, spoke about non-lethal methods as an alternative method for managing the deer population.

Ryan Morton, Ward 1 resident, spoke about A2FixIt and a group of citizens called A2CivicTech. An event will be held next Monday from 7 to 8:30 p.m. on the third floor of the Downtown Library.

Kim Corona spoke in opposition to the City's deer cull and urged Council to consider non-lethal methods for deer management in future years.

ADJOURNMENT

A motion was made by Councilmember Lumm, seconded by Councilmember Ackerman, that the meeting adjourn. On a voice vote, the Mayor Pro Tem declared the motion carried and the meeting adjourned at 10:15 p.m.
