COUNCILMEMBER GRAND

Councilmember Grand thanked the young members of the community for coming out to tonight's meeting to speak and show their advocacy.

Councilmember Grand introduced the nominations for the newly-created Independent Community Police Oversight Commission. She spoke about the process used by herself and Councilmembers Ackerman, Lumm and Ramlawi to determine the nominations that would be brought forward to Council for consideration.

COUNCILMEMBER RAMLAWI

Councilmember Ramlawi also spoke about the ICPOC nomination process. He thanked community members for attending his recent coffee hour.

Councilmember Ramlawi highlighted Item F-6 on the Agenda, regarding an update from the LDFA.

COUNCILMEMBER HAYNER

Councilmember Hayner stated the monthly CARD meeting is coming up this week. He spoke about the recent detection of 1,4 dioxane in the City's water.

Councilmember Hayner spoke about the possibility of Ann Arbor becoming a fair trade town.

COUNCILMEMBER BANNISTER

Councilmember Bannister stated the first new Council Caucus meeting was a success with six Councilmembers attending and approximately 40 members of the public. She stated the next meeting will be on Sunday, March 17, in advance of the March 18 City Council meeting.

COUNCILMEMBER SMITH

Councilmember Smith spoke about upcoming events at the University of Michigan.

COUNCILMEMBER LUMM

Councilmember Lumm thanked members of the audience for coming out to the meeting to speak about climate action and other issues of concern.

Councilmember Lumm spoke about AC-2 and the proposed crosswalk changes at Huron High School. She urged staff to set up a public meeting with the Huron community.

COUNCILMEMBER NELSON

Councilmember Nelson stated she is hopeful that there will still be a public conversation among Council regarding the process for making the nominations to the ICPOC.

Councilmember Nelson spoke about an upcoming public meeting regarding the construction projects at Seventh and Scio Church and Seventh and Stadium Blvd.

PUBLIC COMMENT - GENERAL (3 MINUTES EACH)

Richard Taylor, resident, spoke about the City's lawsuit with Peters Building Company. He stated this developer should not be negotiated with and the project should be denied.

An unidentified speaker addressed climate action and urged Council to support sustainability efforts in the City.

COMMUNICATIONS FROM COUNCIL

MAYOR TAYLOR

Mayor Taylor addressed the 40/40/20 strategy for the use of the County millage rebate proceeds. He stated the Council has historically passed a millage usage resolution prior to the community's vote on millages. He stated future Councils have always respected these resolutions, noting they have been passed regarding Parks and other voter-approved millages in the past.

COUNCILMEMBER RAMLAWI

Councilmember Ramlawi addressed the 40/40/20 resolution for the millage rebate funds. He stated many members were not part of that resolution approval, but still have a responsibility to pass a balanced budget. He stated changing the 40/40/20 formula is not to defund sustainability, but to allow Council to pass a balanced budget.

COUNCILMEMBER NELSON

Councilmember Nelson thanked Councilmember Lumm for withdrawing her proposed resolution at this time. She stated the rebate funding of the millage was unprecedented, noting that no other community who received the rebate funds passed a resolution of intent.

COUNCILMEMBER SMITH

Councilmember Smith spoke about the public outreach to Council recently regarding climate action funding and the community's support for the City to continue climate action plans.

COUNCILMEMBER ACKERMAN

Councilmember Ackerman thanked Councilmember Lumm for withdrawing her resolution, DC-3, regarding the millage rebate funds. He spoke about Council's commitment to the public's interest. COUNCILMEMBER HAYNER

Councilmember Hayner addressed the funding of climate action and the use of the millage rebate funds. He said Council should be able to prepare a budget annually with the use of these funds as needed.
