1. Ralph McKee - Short Term Rentals (CA-18)

Ralph McKee, 1116 Red Oak, spoke in support of CA-18 and Option 3 for Short Term Rental regulations. *Mr. McKee stated short-term rentals are hurting affording housing efforts.*

2. Noah Hoffman - Short Term Rentals (CA-18)

Noah Hoffman, 1765 Northbrook, spoke in opposition to CA-18 and option 3. He stated option 1 and less regulation is preferred.

3. Carol Skala - Short Term Rentals (CA-18)

Carol Skala spoke in opposition to CA-18 and questioned the outcomes of the Carlisle Wortman report.

4. Shannon Hautamaki - Short Term Rentals (CA-18)

Shannon Hautamaki, 1110 Brooklyn, spoke in support of regulation for short-term rentals.

5. Cathy Strachan - Short Term Rentals (CA-18)

Cathy Strachan, resident, stated existing short-term rental units should be grandfathered and not subject to new zoning regulations.

6. Kathy Stroud - Short Term Rentals (CA-18)

Kathy Stroud, 2271 Placid Way, spoke in support of CA-18.

7. Mozhgan Savabieasfahani - Resolution Supporting the Environmental Protection Agency's Active Involvement with the Gelman Site and Encouraging its Listing of the same as a "Superfund" Site (DC-1)

Mozhgan Savabieasfahani, resident, spoke about the Gelman plume and conflict in the Middle East.

Henry Herskovitz, resident, spoke about his group's protests outside Beth Israel and the reasons for this choice of location.

Councilmember Griswold thanked Councilmember Nelson for her work with developing a resident newsletter and her publication of Council vote tables.

Councilmember Griswold thanked the public for their attendance at Council meetings. She stated some conversations can be uncomfortable, but noted that the Council is making progress on important issues.

Councilmember Ramlawi wished everyone a happy new year.

COUNCILMEMBER HAYNER

Councilmember Hayner reminded Council and the public of the upcoming CARD (Coalition for Action on the Remediation of Dioxane) meeting this week.

Councilmember Hayner acknowledged those in the room who were in opposition to the City's annual deer cull.

Councilmember Hayner stated there remains confusion over the William Street bike lane, noting he has seen many cars turn from Main Street into the bike lane. He also stated cyclists need to follow the road rules at intersections.

COUNCILMEMBER GRAND

Councilmember Grand encouraged Council and the public to join in the United Way's 21-day equity challenge.

Councilmember Grand thanked Chief Cox and the AAPD for joining the religious community at Liberty Plaza for a celebration of Hanukah.

COUNCILMEMBER ACKERMAN

Councilmember Ackerman addressed Mr. Herskovitz's comments about protesting outside Temple Beth Emeth. He stated Mr. Herskovitz's comments are anti-Semitic and promoting a distrust amongst neighbors.

PUBLIC COMMENT - GENERAL (3 MINUTES EACH)

An unidentified short-term rental host spoke in opposition to the City's proposed regulation of short-term rental units. She urged the City to "grandfather" existing properties that have operated legally under existing rules.

Grant Shafer, Ypsilanti, spoke in opposition to the City's deer cull.

An unidentified short-term rental host spoke in opposition to the proposed "Option 3" of the short-term rental regulations. She also stated student rentals should not be treated differently. An unidentified short-term rental host spoke in opposition to regulation of short-term rentals. He stated most Airbnbs are not owner-occupied so the proposed regulation would affectively ban short-term rental in Ann Arbor.

Dwight Smith spoke in opposition to the City's deer cull.

An owner of a short-term rental business spoke about the benefits of short-term rentals, including job opportunities.

An unidentified speaker talked about the benefits of short-term rentals.

An unidentified speaker talked about affordable housing and his personal housing situation. He also spoke about the deer cull and the need to reintroduce wolves into the ecosystem.

An unidentified short-term rental host spoke about Airbnb, stating the community supports and wants them. He stated banning short-term rentals would not fix the affordability issues in Ann Arbor.

COMMUNICATIONS FROM COUNCIL

COUNCILMEMBER HAYNER

Councilmember Hayner addressed the public's concerns regarding short-term rentals.

COUNCILMEMBER BANNISTER

Councilmember Bannister thanked the public for their comments regarding short-term rentals. She urged residents and owners to stay engaged.

COUNCILMEMBER LUMM

Councilmember Lumm also spoke about short-term rentals and the public engagement process that has taken place on this issue. She stated she would continue to advocate for neighborhoods and residents.

COUNCILMEMBER ACKERMAN

Councilmember Ackerman addressed his earlier remarks regarding Mr. Henry Herskovitz's behavior and comments. He stated they were only his own opinions and not those of City Council.

MAYOR TAYLOR

Mayor Taylor addressed short-term rentals and the proposed regulations. He stated his concerns relate specifically to the preservation of neighborhoods.
